




CHALLENGES FACED

COVID-19 RESPONSE

- Pandemic response that drew statewide bipartisan praise
- Vaccination plan that was one of the most efficient in our nation



FRANCIS SCOTT KEY BRIDGE COLLAPSE



- Passed historic lobbying reforms
- Created, expanded, and strengthenedOffice of the Inspector General
- Established first-ever Fair Election Fund




