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Overview of Homeless Services in Baltimore County


Focus of DHCD – Housing for All: A Continuum



Point-in-Time (PIT) Counts 2019-2025



First Time Homeless — Increase in those losing Permanent Housing and becoming homeless



Services Available to Homeless People or those at Risk of Becoming Homeless



Who Seeks Homeless Services in Baltimore County?

- We served approximately 3,039 individuals in FY24.
 - 1,483 served in shelter and street outreach
 - 295 served in Permanent Housing (includes PSH and Rapid ReHousing)

Demographics:

- 29% under age 18, 70% ages 18-64 and 7% 65+
- 27% White, 68% Black, less than 5% identified as Hispanic/Latino
- 63 (2%) are veterans
- · 5% come from hospital or nursing home

Self-Reported Barriers to Housing at Project Entry:

- 33% report a mental health disorder
- · 23% report a physical or developmental disability
- 17% report a history of DV or are actively fleeing a DV situation
- · 20% report a chronic health condition



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Temporary and Permanent Housing Totals (Housing Inventory Count, 2025)

Emergency Shelter	# of Dedicated Beds
Family Shelter (includes 72 for single women)	365
Single Male Shelter	140
Domestic Violence Beds	31
Total Year Round Beds	536
Winter Beds	66
Total Shelter Beds	602

Permanent Housing, the county has the following:

- 257 Units of Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) – rent and services for the highest needs
 - 98% occupied
 - 120 Chronically homeless on wait list
- 318 Allocated VASH Vouchers for Veterans only, open to all vets outside of the county
 - Must meet all VA criteria to be eligibility

How People End Up Living Unsheltered

Those that accept shelter

 Referred to Shelter through Coordinated Entry hotline - only Monday-Friday 8:30am-4:30pm.

Those who are suicidal/homicidal

 County crisis response works with EMS and Police to execute an emergency Petition (EP) referral to hospital. People generally are back on the street within 24-48 hours.

Those who are using substance and accept treatment Residential treatment Crisis Beds – severely limited (20 beds currently), open to anyone in need across the state. Outpatient treatment services, extremely difficult for unsheltered to maintain appointments.

Those with an active mental health need but are not medically compliant

 Homeless outreach teams can only encourage people to health services and help them connect through tele-health, but they do not provide services directly and cannot require compliance.


Those who are chronically homeless (those with a documented disability)


Wait for permanent supportive housing (rent and services help). Only 289
units across the county, stays fully occupied – 189 people on waitlist, 94%
have been homeless since 2019 or earlier.




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Are things Getting Better or Worse?








Baltimore County's percentage of returns to homelessness, within 6 months of housing placement, has declined by more than 50% since 2019.

The average length of time homeless across all programs is 99 days, almost back to pre-pandemic levels (80 days). These averages are nearly double for clients being served by street outreach teams.
